Title of the Webinar:

Empowering Career Counseling Practices with Responsible Generative Al

Abstract

Artificial intelligence (AI) is reshaping career counseling by accelerating and enriching self-assessment, skill development, career exploration, job search, job matching, and labor market analysis. Al-driven tools such as chatbots and virtual assistants deliver personalized guidance, enabling new opportunities for life and career design (D'Silva

et al., 2020; Jarrahi et al., 2022). This interactive workshop demonstrates how generative Al

can be strategically integrated into career counseling practices to support career planning, career decisionmaking, career preparation, and job search skills. Participants will gain hands-on experience in designing Alassisted career activities, writing effective prompts, and evaluating AI outputs, while critically discussing ethical considerations,

responsible AI use, and emerging competencies for career practitioners.

The workshop emphasizes meaningful AI integration that enhances practice while safeguarding the human-centered foundation of the counseling relationship.

University (2017-2018) and Boston University (2023-2024). Dr. Özdemir's research focuses on STEM career development, career adaptability, program design,


multicultural career counseling and ethics.




